

BIBLICAL TRUTH

Developing a Students Christian Worldview

Summary

The video discusses the importance of developing a Christian worldview in students as part of the 'biblical truth' vital for youth ministry. Eran and Andy emphasize that merely imparting biblical knowledge is insufficient; students must also have their desires aligned with biblical principles. They introduce the 'three B's' framework - behold, believe, and become - which shapes behavior. The key is to help students 'behold' godly influences, 'believe' biblical truths, and allow those truths to shape their identity ('become'), leading to Christ-like behavior. The discussion highlights the need to address the root desires rather than just modifying outward behavior.

Main Points

Introduction to Developing a Christian Worldview

Eran and Andy introduce the topic of shaping a Christian worldview in students as part of the 'biblical truth' vital in youth ministry. They explain that having biblical knowledge alone is insufficient for living as a disciple of Christ; one must also think like a disciple. A Christian worldview involves seeing the world through the lens of Scripture rather than interpreting Scripture through the lens of the world.

The Importance of Desires in Decision-Making

Andy shares insights from Dr. Kahneman's research, which found that people make decisions based on their desires first, and then their knowledge center rationalizes them. This challenges the traditional view that people make decisions based on factual knowledge. Andy emphasizes that to change behavior, one must change desires, not just impart knowledge.

The 'Three B's' Framework

Andy introduces the 'three B's' framework - behold, believe, and become - to shape a Christian worldview. 'Behold' refers to what we surround ourselves with as we become like what we behold. 'Believe' involves filling students' minds with biblical truth and facts. 'Become' is about identity formation, where beliefs shape who we become. Behavior is the fruit of this process.

Avoiding Behavior Modification

The speakers caution against focusing solely on behavior modification, as true transformation comes from a change in desires and identity. Christianity is not about avoiding sin but following Jesus. As students fall in love with Jesus and behold His beauty, their desires will align with His, leading to Christ-like behavior.

Action Items

- Be mindful of the influences and community surrounding students, as they will shape their desires and beliefs.
- Teach students to defend their faith and articulate their beliefs, not just recite facts.
- Help students identify lies they have believed and replace them with biblical truths, shaping their identity in Christ.
- Invite students to an adventure of following Jesus rather than presenting a list of rules and behaviors to avoid.
- Preach and teach in a way that addresses the root desires and beliefs, not just outward behavior.
