

What is the Gospel - Panel

Summary

This video emphasizes the importance of understanding the true meaning of the gospel and its impact on discipling students. The key points were:

- 1) The gospel is good news about what Jesus has done for us, not good advice on living.
- 2) The gospel not only saves us but also grows us spiritually.
- 3) The gospel is about 'we' (the community of believers) rather than just 'me'.
- 4) The gospel's impact extends beyond personal salvation to the redemption of all creation. This video emphasizes helping students reframe their understanding of the gospel and its implications for their lives, relationships, and the world around them.

Main Points

#1 - The Gospel is Good News, Not Good Advice

A common misconception is that the gospel is merely good advice for living a moral life rather than the good news of what Jesus has done to redeem humanity. The gospel is not about earning God's favor through our performance but resting in the finished work of Christ on our behalf.

#2 - The Gospel Grows Us Up

The gospel is not just the starting point of the Christian life but also the ongoing source of spiritual growth. Just as Paul confronted Peter for not living according to the gospel, believers need to continually rely on its power to transform their lives. The gospel should permeate all teaching, counseling, and discipleship efforts.

#3 - The Gospel is About 'We', Not Just 'Me'

The gospel's impact extends beyond individual salvation to the redemption of a community of believers. The language of the Bible emphasizes the collective nature of salvation, portraying it as the gathering of a people for God's purposes. The gospel unites believers in a way that transcends individual differences and interests.

#4 - The Gospel Redeems All Creation

The gospel's scope encompasses not only humanity's salvation but also the redemption of all creation. Students need to learn to live out the gospel's implications in their communities and relationships, bringing order and restoration to brokenness. The gospel calls believers to be stewards of creation and agents of its renewal.

Next Steps

- Consider the gospel as good news, not good advice, and as the source of ongoing spiritual growth.
- Remind students that the gospel is not just about individual salvation but about being part of a redeemed community.
- Teach students to live out the gospel's implications in their relationships, neighborhoods, and stewardship of creation.
- Help students reframe their understanding of the gospel and its impact on all aspects of their lives.
