Gen Z is the generation with the highest rates of anxiety, stress, and depression, even at a young age. This is attributed to their lack of

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connectedness, societal pressures, fear of the pandemic and social changes, and concerns about being judged or disliked by others. Their underdeveloped minds and hearts are burdened by these overwhelming emotions.
